Guided Listening Activity

Peter and the Wolf is a musical composition written in 1936. The narrator tells the story while instruments of the orchestra play the story. This type of composition is called a **Tone Poem**. The composer uses the different sounds (**Timbre**) and high and low notes (**Pitch**) to represent each animal.

- 1. Which instrument do you think is best suited to the animal or person it represents?
- 2. Most of the instruments come from one section of the orchestra. Can you name the section?



- 3. Do you think the composer chose the right instruments for each animal? Flute-bird, Duck-oboe, Cat-clarinet, French horns-wolf.
- 4. Which of the instruments do you like the best and why?


Using your knees and hands (body percussion) see if you can make a rhythm pattern that you think may frighten the wolf.

Creative Music Making

The story of Peter and The Wolf has some anxious moments when the tension in the music builds. On the next page is a chart of the tension and a list of events in the story. Writing on the chart put the event where you think it may be shown. It will start with the calm morning at the beginning and end with the hunters and Peter take the wolf to the zoo in a triumphant procession.

- 1. The calm morning at the beginning.
- 2. When the duck and bird are arguing and the cat sneaks up on them.
- 3. After the argument, Grandfather comes out and the morning is calmer again.
- 4. The wolf comes out and there is a chase where the duck gets caught.
- 5. Peter, the cat and the bird are up the tree working on a plan.
- 6. The bird flies around the wolf's head and the lasso gets closer and closer.
- 7. The wolf is caught.
- 8. The hunters and Peter take the wolf to the zoo in a triumphant procession.


On the stave below are some notes which spell words. Underneath each note write the letters to spell the words. The first one has been done for you.
