Start Date: 6th November 2023 Finish Date: 9th December 2023



Hook:

The children will be introduced to the historical event by looking at a variety of sources and being detectives, using clues to investigate the past.

Rationale:

The children will be given opportunities to learn about a significant event and people from the past and how they have influenced the emergency services of today.

Outcome:

The children will have used sources to learn information about the great fire of London and use their information to answer questions to deeper their understanding of the event and people involved. They will be able to compare how such an event would be handled today and know how to behave in an emergency situation.

Focus Area: History

Through learning about the Great Fire of London and Samuel Pepys the children will learn about the sequence of events in the past. They will use different sources of information to ask and answer simple questions. Children will understand what an eyewitness is.

They will show a sense of chronology by using vocabulary linked to the passing of time and will place events in chronological order. They will begin to give reasons for, and results of, the main changes and events.

Children will investigate how our own lives are different from those of the past and begin to recognise why people in the past acted as they did.

Supporting Focus Area: Science

Pupils will explore everyday materials. They will identify and compare materials, using reasoning skills to determine which is best for particular uses. They will explore changing the shapes of solid objects made of some materials by squashing, bending, twisting & stretching them. We will consider which materials would be best to help fight the Great Fire of London!

Supporting Focus Area: Art, Design and Technology

Pupils will explore methods of assembling and joining materials. They will learn how to use simple tools safely and correctly. In relation to the Great Fire of London, they will generate their own design and then measure, mark out and shape a range of materials leading to the construction of their own fire engine with moving parts. They will also explore the use of axels in wheels and design as part of their design.

Pupils will look at art depicting fire and create their own interpretation of the Great Fire of London.
