


Money -Giving change

20p fifty pence coin two pence coin ten pence coin two pound coir one pound coin five pence coin twenty pence coin one penny coin

To work out how much change you get, you need to find the difference between the amount of money you have and the amount you spend.

To find the difference, we count on. So - if we spend 15p on a sweet and we pay with a 50p coin the number sentence looks like this -50p - 15p = ?

and we use a number line to count on from 15p to 50p.


Punch and Judy




350 years old. Originally a clown-like character 'Pulcinella' from Italy. This means 'Little Chicken!


Punch changed from being a string puppet to a hand puppet.

We will find out about the other characters next week..










JOEY THE CLOWN.

The crocodile became part of the show because of the Victorian interest in exotic animals and zoos.






