Last night, I had the pleasure of accompanying Mrs Kingsbury and one of our governors, Mrs Tuck and the school choir to a vocal prom at Carisbrooke Castle. After some pretty poor weather in the morning and at lunch time the sun shone beautifully for the late afternoon and early evening performances. The choir rehearsed their song, then performed it on the stage before a rather large crowd. They sang with all of the other schools for a few numbers too and it was a truly lovely evening. Thank you to Mrs Riches for getting the choir prepared - she was very busy organising and leading all the schools - although she did lead Queensgate individual song too.



Staffing News

I have received a resignation, from Miss Young in Year 6. Miss Young has been with the team for five years but has made the decision to move to the mainland. She will be greatly missed, not only by the Year 6 team, but from all the sports teams she has been involved with - helping them achieve tremendous success over the years.

Apart from teachers, we will not be employing any new teaching assistants - instead we will be having a shift around internally. I have nearly completed having 1:1 conversations with all of the staff; by having these discussions it helps myself and the other Senior Leaders to build the staffing structure for next year.

Any changes will be shared after the Move up morning on 8th July. Although not employed directly by the school, the Chartwells team in the kitchen are very much part of the Queensgate team. I am pleased (and also sad) to report that Mrs Norman, our cook for over 20 years, has secured a promotion as Area Manager. This is amazing news for her but is another change for Queensgate. Mrs Norman is continuing until the end of the summer term, then Chartwells will find a suitable replacement for the new academic year. We wish Mrs Norman all the very best in her new role.

Dance Live

I have given the go ahead for Queensgate to enter the Dance Live event again next year. They have already arranged for rehearsals to start and I can't wait to see the theme and what they come up with. To help with costumes, make up, background and props the PTFA has donated some money to the team. They also started tuck again today (which is very popular with the children!) Thank you for your continued support.

National tests and checks

Year 1 have administered the phonics screen to all children and I will share with you the results when the pass mark has been confirmed. The children did really well and the staffing team in Reception and Year 1 have worked really hard delivering our phonics scheme to the children. Early reading is improving as a result. Some children in Year 2, who did not pass in Year 1 have resat the phonics screen, and again I hope for some positive news to reflect the hard work of the children and the Year 2 teaching team. Year 4 also sat their Multiplication Tables Check this week - there has been a production line of pupils going in one at a time to complete the test online. Once again I will share with you results at a later date.

Year 6 SATs results will be released on July 8th and the Year 6 team will share these with the children after they return from their secondary school transition day. Parents will receive official confirmation as part of the end of year reports, and I will share whole Year 6 data as a percentage towards the end of term.

Summer Term Assessments

Next week is assessment week. This is the final opportunity for children to show how much they have learned in Reading , writing and maths. The tests are internal only and it helps the teachers with their Teacher Assessments - which will be shared with you in the end of year reports. The children are used to this and view it as part of their lessons; these tests are intentionally low key so as to not inflict any unnecessary stress on the children. Many have told me that they like to do them and see their scores increase which is a great attitude to have. As always, where extra support or differentiation is needed, tests will be adapted to ensure that individually all children can show they have made progress.

Sports News

Year 3 and 4 Netball

On Monday 9th June children from Year 3 and 4 travelled to Ryde Academy to take part in a netball festival, along with three other island schools. This was an opportunity for children to learn and expand their skills including, passing, shooting and most importantly team work.

They started with a warm up and then got straight into some game play. The children gained more and more confidence throughout the afternoon and had a great time playing together.



Year 5 and 6 Handball

On Thursday 12th June, a team from Year 6 travelled to Smallbrook to take part in the Island Handball competition. We did well in our group, winning three out of four games and progressing through to the next round. The competition was tough and we certainly stepped up to the mark. We faced, Hunnyhill, Haylands and Barton; coming out with two wins and a loss. This meant we finished second overall securing silver medals and a place in the Hampshire Finals on Friday 11th July. Well done Queensgate!

Year 6 STEM Day

On Tuesday 10th June, Year 6 took on the summer NCR STEM Quest - their third and final challenge of the year.

During the morning the children took on the Structures Challenge where they learnt about the basic principles of civil engineering. During their discovery mission they explored strong shapes, learnt about different kinds of bridges and the forces acting on a bridge – tension and compression. They were then tasked with designing and building a bridge that spans a 30cm gap and that could support a 500g load. All bridges were tested with varying success. Some bridges were sadly unable to sustain 100g while others managed the 500g target. Two managed to support 800g and one supported a huge 1000g load!

During the afternoon, the children embarked on an exciting journey with the Rocket Launcher Challenge. Again when tested there was mixed success! Some failed to launch but the winning rocket travelled 2.5 meters.

The children worked incredibly well in their teams showing perseverance, resilience and problems were solved when needed to improve designs.



UKSA


On Wednesday 11th June the children in Year 6 took part in UKSA's free Test the Water programme. This gives children the opportunity to experience sailing in a safe and supportive environment. The children had the chance to sail on a range of different boats all skippered by an instructor, they had a ride on the RIB, some had a go at capsizing, some faced their fear of the water; but most importantly all of them had an amazing time. The children behaved impeccably both on the walk to and from UKSA and while sailing. They were a credit to Queensgate.

Queensgate Out & About

Our Reception Out and About team had a great time on the beach, on Tuesday morning. The children loved making cakes and ice-creams in our sand café, paddling in the sea, collecting water, burying each other in the sand, collecting shells and jumping off the wall! The group demonstrated great focus, especially when making their sand cakes and played beautifully together. We had some lovely comments from members of the public about what a lovely time the children were having, exploring the different toys on the beach.



On Tuesday afternoon, our Year 3 Out and About group hiked across the fields, down to the Folly as part of their work on rivers. The children drew comparisons between the Western Yar estuary and the River Medina, noting that there was more litter, more boats, more housing and larger scale industries along the riverbank. The group identified key features of the river, applying their new vocabulary.



The children in Year 1 will soon begin their learning about Grace Darling and the role of the RNLI. This week's Out and About group travelled over to Niton to see St Catherine's Lighthouse. The group sketched the octagonal tower (making sure they included key details within their drawing). They listened to The Lighthouse Keeper's Catastrophe whilst sketching and then had a walk along the coast towards Watershoot Bay.



On Wednesday afternoon, our Year 2 adventurers enjoyed a walk around Firestone Copse identifying types of trees and plants. The children used their 'Leaf ID charts' to name different species and discussed which trees are evergreen and which are deciduous. The group had fun playing in dens, climbing on fallen trees and taking it in turns to lead the group.



NHS 111 Online & Local Pharmacies

NHS 111 online and local pharmacies can help you get the right care

People with urgent but non-life-threatening medical needs are encouraged to use NHS 111 online to get quick advice and be directed to the most appropriate care, especially over the bank holiday weekend when services are expected to be busy.

NHS 111 online is a fast and easy-to-use alternative to the NHS 111 phone service. It can provide help for people 5 years and over by assessing symptoms, giving advice on what to do next, and connecting people to local services without having to wait on the phone.

Whether you need help with a minor injury, mental health support, advice about dental pain, or emergency medication, NHS 111 online is available 24/7. It's especially useful if you can't get a GP appointment or your surgery is closed.

Sophia from Newport recently searched 111.nhs.uk for help when she woke up with red, itchy insect bites after a family BBQ. When they started getting worse, she used NHS 111 online for advice and was directed to her local pharmacy. The pharmacist recommended a cream and gave her tips on managing the symptoms including what to do if the bites got worse.

Sophia said: "I was glad I went online first. A friend suggested I go to hospital but that didn't feel right for a few bites. The pharmacy was exactly what I needed."

Lee Haward, IW Ambulance Service Head of Clinical Coordination Centre, said: "If you've got access to the internet, NHS 111 online is a really quick and easy way to get help. It works just like calling 111, but you can do it all online, anytime, day or night. Just go to the NHS 111 website or use the NHS App, answer a few questions about how you're feeling, and it will guide you to the right care. It's really easy to use and there when you need help."

Pharmacies can help with minor illnesses - Your local pharmacy is also a great source of expert help for minor conditions. As part of the Pharmacy First scheme, many community pharmacies can now offer clinical advice and treatment for common illnesses without the need to see a GP:

Sinusitis

Sore throat

Earache

Infected insect bites

Impetigo (a bacterial skin infection)

Shingles

Uncomplicated urinary tract infections (in women)

Nature Notes in Brief

Bumble bees are not the same as Honey bees

Bumble bees are wild bees. They live in small colonies or even on their own (solitary bees) in tiny holes in the ground - often previously made and abandoned by a mouse or in a tree hole. Bumble bees only live for a year. The queen bee once mated, will hibernate for the Winter. The other bees die having done their job. The queen emerges in early Spring looking for pollen and nectar to feed her larva now in a cocoon. The larva emerge as female worker bees bringing back more pollen to the nest. The queen lays more eggs which will hatch into new queens and male bumble bees. The newly mated queens feed on nectar and pollen ready to overwinter in an underground burrow. The rest of the bumblebees in the colony die as the weather begins to turn colder.
